## A Letter from the President

The storm that devastated west central Wisconsin the night of July 15, 1980, will long be remembered as "The Big Wind." It was the costliest natural disaster in our state's history with damage estimates topping

\$160 million in just a four-county area. The destruction of homes, farms and thousands of trees was unimaginable On the NSP system, five major transmission lines and a dozen smaller lines were knocked out. Every

structure in a 10-mile stretch of our major 345 kV supply line was completely destroyed. Our distribution system was turned into a tangled web of wire and splintered poles that left more than 150,000 people without electricity, some of them for more than a week. That awful night in July brought out more than hardship and destruction, however. It brought out the best in us as a team of people who make up this

Line crews working 19-hour days became the rule rather than the exception. Phones were manned night and day by volunteers from many departments who reassuringly answered the thousands of calls from customers. Employees at all levels worked at unfamiliar tasks in a Herculean effort to reconstruct in a few days a system that took years to build.

In recognition of that effort, this special publication was prepared for and is dedicated to you, the special people of NSP. Your dedication and skills gave our customers a feeling of security, a feeling that they were in "good hands" and need not worry.

Although few persons outside the power industry fully understand the enormously complex problems encountered in restoring our electrical system, your commitment to complete the job under some of the most adverse conditions truly presented our communities with a heart-warming nicture of the kind of people who work at NSP. I am proud of you and you can be justifiably proud

of your accomplishments during the past few weeks. A disaster like the one we have just experienced exposes true character in a way which nothing else can.

For giving so much for so long thank you
